SOWING INFO

Sow Outside: Ornamental corn seeds should be planted after soil temps have reached 55-60 F. Sow seeds to a depth of 1-2 inches deep and 8-10 inches apart for small eared varieties and 10-12 inches apart for large eared Start Inside: Not Recommended. Days to Emerge: 5 - 10 days Seed Depth: 1-2'' Seed Spacing: 10-12'' Row Spacing: 30-42'' Thinning: Plant in rows 2 1/2 to 3 feet apart. Drop seed every 5 to 6 inches and cover with 1 inch of soil. Plants should be thinned, leaving one stalk every 12 inches.

GROWING INFO

Harvesting: Ornamental corn is harvested by hand after the husk has dried and when the ears are no longer green but dried slightly and fully mature. To harvest, break the ears off with a quick downward tug leaving the husk on to finish drying over the course of a week

Fruit: 9" ears.
